TORCH Talks 2025

Performance Research:

This year has seen some major new TORCH initiatives in performance research. In October TORCH launched the <u>Performance Research Hub</u> led by Professor Gascia Ouzounian (Music)



This Research Hub will align with new opportunities for performance research and practice. In due course we hope to build up to an interdisciplinary Oxford Masters course (MSt.) in Performance Research. A grant from the Van Houten Fund has enabled a number of strategic workshops and seed-funded performance-related collaborations. On 2 December we hosted a busy Performance Research networking event which saw 15 speakers from across local arts and cultural/academic sectors offering 3-minute pitches across a rich range of media and themes.

Performance Research also shapes the agenda of the Royal Shakespeare Company's major AHRC-funded initiative, the <u>Interdisciplinary Fellows</u> scheme.

TORCH is a proud partner in this scheme alongside BAM (Brooklyn Academy of Music); The Music Center (LA); MIT Open Documentary Lab; Stanford Arts; Watershed (Bristol). TORCH is hosting two RSC fellows, the director Stephen Bailey and the cultural producer Amahra Spence.

TORCH International

2024 has seen the launch of some major new TORCH global initiatives as well as the continued success of existing initiatives. We are proud to announce the launch of <u>CaribOx</u>, a joint TORCH and All Souls College scheme enabling academics from Caribbean universities to take up visiting fellowships and travel grants at Oxford. The first open call attracted a large



number and wide range of applicants across all fields and disciplines. We are grateful to all involved including Professor Maria del Pilar Blanco' our academic lead, and the AfOx team from whom we learned so much.

The <u>Javett-Up BRIDGE Fellowship Programme</u> University of Pretoria Fellowship, open to Oxford researchers working within the fine arts, is now moving into its third year. The collaborations between Oxford scholars and the unique Javett collection have led to some ground breaking cross-disciplinary work.

TORCH/All Souls have also hosted as the Global Visiting Professor Dr Fouzia Farooq from Islamabad Pakistan, who works on the intersections between fiction and history and is currently writing a historical novel on the medieval poet Amir Khosrow. Her talks at Oxford have focused on gender and performativity.

Two major TORCH/European initiatives in Sweden and Germany launched this year. The Oxford-Uppsala Culture & Creativity cluster cemented by an MoU between TORCH and Uppsala's CIRCUS, has involved collaborations through workshops and an in-person event in Oxford in late November (our Swedish colleagues brought with them unseasonably early snow). Our focus is (broadly) on AI and Creativity, a subject constantly in the news. We are planning a larger funded project on this theme but we are also generating blogs and pamphlets. Uppsala is currently embarking on a larger cross-university initiative on interdisciplinarity, and in late November, representing TORCH, I gave a lecture at the Dean's conference in Uppsala on 'TORCH and the Future of Interdisciplinarity'.

We have also established an MoU with UdK, the University of Arts Berlin. UdK's unique specialisms in fine arts, design, performance and community engagement will prove valuable to Oxford as we move towards the Schwarzman Centre. We have an



open seed-funding call designed to enable UdK and Oxford scholars to collaborate across projects. TORCH is also a partner in the relationship between Oxford and BUA (the Berlin University Alliance) consortium which fosters mutual research engagement across a range of thematic areas, including democratic resilience, digital worlds, ageing and Ai and equity.

Research Hubs and Networks

Interdisciplinary research Hubs and Networks are at the heart of the TORCH community. They bring together researchers and create research

communities and a culture of experimentation and collaboration. Our Research Hubs include <u>Environmental Humanities</u>, <u>Race and Resistance</u>, <u>Performance</u>
<u>Research</u>, <u>Intersectional Humanities</u> and this year <u>Medical Humanities</u> has gone

from strength to strength. In October it held a ground-breaking conference on Biotechnology and <u>What Makes us Human</u>.

New networks have been established, fusing scholarly research with contemporary imperatives: these include Rent Cultures, Neurodiversity, Ars Memoriae, Divination, Oracles and Omens, and Labour.
